Juvenile Offenders

“According to the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, on any given day 92,854 convicted youth offenders resided in out-of-home care”
(Sickmund, Sladky and Kang, 2008).

 - Juvenile's family
 - Community
 - Potential future victims

Resident Offender's Experiences

- How do youth offenders experience their treatment while in residential care?
- Does the type of program have a bearing on one's experiences?
- How do young offenders experience the deterrence part of incarceration?
- What part of their treatment or confinement do offenders consider useful in preventing future criminal involvement?

Preventing Delinquency

- Parent Management Training is most effective when used in conjunction with other Treatments (Mulford and Redding, 2008, p. 636)
- Roughly 60–70% of incarcerated juveniles have one or more psychiatric illnesses (Karnik and Steiner 2007, p. 154)

Missouri's Approach to Juvenile Justice

- *Missouri's Different Approach* (2009)
 - Strict and stable environment
 - No guards of lock-downs
 - Discipline and routine enforced
 - Communication encouraged

The parenthetical is abbreviated to the year since the title is used in the sentence.
